We walk into a new situation with all the confidence of someone with absolutely no idea what they're doing. In fact, there's a scientific principle at play here. It's called the Dunning-Kruger effect. It's been proven in social science that when you have just a tiny bit of knowledge about a subject you tend to be more confident of your abilities and knowledge than even an expert in the field.



According to the Dunning-Kruger effect we begin our journey into a new subject area with very little knowledge and a whole lot of confidence. Let's call this point in our journey "mount stupid." But what happens to us in that moment when we recognize that something is much more difficult than we realize, is that our confidence drops dramatically. This is when we want to give up. We

panic. We suddenly realize that it is simply too hard.

It's right there at the intersection of "mount stupid" and the pit of despair that we join Jesus' disciples in the book of Matthew chapter 14. You know the story. Peter gets out of the boat stepping out onto the water in the dark. Why? Because Jesus told him to.

We've all been there, the moment when something easy became just as impossible as walking on water, but how often does this happen in our spiritual lives? In our relationships with people? In those areas where we simply can't choose a different hobby or let that acoustic guitar gather dust in the closet?

The question isn't what caused Peter to be able to walk on the water, because any good churchgoer will have that answer readily at hand. The question is what caused him to STOP walking on water?

There are at least a couple of good explanations. One is doubt. Or perhaps it is because Peter looked away from Jesus. But most of the answers point to the same thing. Fear struck because Peter allowed himself to begin thinking about the situation the way the world does. Peter felt the

"It is not power that corrupts, but fear," she writes, "Fear of losing power corrupts those who wield it and fear of the scourge of power corrupts those who are subject to it." ²

Jesus did not back down from conflict although none of us can love those we disagree with in the same way that Jesus did. At least not on our own power. In Matthew, if we pick out certain verses to support our argument, we can choose the Jesus we want to portray.

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wind and he saw the waves that he was walking on top of and it suddenly occurred to him that it was impossible to walk on water, so he sank.

Here's the thing. HE WAS ALREADY DOING IT.

This is one of the ways that fear can hold us back. We have been there before, when doubt got the best of us, and we don't want to go there again. This is one way the world sees it: Get back in the boat! Here's a new way to look at it: Our worst fears can be our greatest teachers. ¹ Peter's step out into the world of the miraculous by itself does not resolve our fear, but his experience together with our fear can teach us a lot about ourselves and about God.

Serving others can be particularly frightening. Will I be rejected? Will they just take advantage of me? Will I be safe? Yet, once we are underway, it is difficult to turn back. People start to depend on us. We realize how much we enjoy it. And fear rushes in bringing doubt with him. Voices either in our head or from people around us tell us that what we are doing doesn't make sense. Perhaps, we begin to think, we should just stop.

The thing is with these kinds of situations in our own lives is that they don't make logical sense in the way the world wants things to make sense. We believe in a God we can't see; a God who is simultaneously three different people, one of whom died through one of the most agonizing execution methods ever devised by humans and rose three days later. We're told that by praying, we can speak to this God who is powerful enough to create the universe and conquer death itself, but that he'll care about even the tiny details of our lives.

The combative debater giving the religious leaders holy heck or the peaceful Jesus telling us that we must forgive anyone who offends us.

While it is more challenging to hold all of scripture in tension as we consider how God is guiding our lives it is really critical that we are able to discern a communal direction. Where is God leading us as a people?

It seems to me that the democratic process lies at the heart of what it takes to faithfully accomplish this whether in a small group or a larger group. We need diversity of voices if we are to arrive at a faithful discernment. This is not to suggest that God does not speak through prophets. But even the prophets are prone to narrow mindedness. We do not know that what we read in scripture from the prophetic voices was not debated before it was captured in the

words that we read. Holy Spirit inspired to me suggests something less than an orderly, single-minded process when I read about Pentecost in the Book of Acts.







For example, is it "sin" or "sins?" and does this nuance matter? Does this statement suggest exclusion of other statements of interpretation such as *Jesus died because He was rejected by those in power*.

Decisions that we make as a people matter. Even decisions where we had no voice. I believe very much in empowerment and representative government. I can't possibly weigh in on every detail and I would rather not have this expectation put on me. While I may disagree with putting parking meters on Saginaw Street, I put my quarters in when I park because persons who I played a role in empowering made a decision on our collective behalf. Elections come frequently and representative government can and does offer opportuni-

ties to change the way things are done.

Disagreements are certain to happen. How can we disagree in ways that do not result in an explosive reaction? How can I get over my own fear of conflict? One idea is to begin here with admitting that I have this fear and recognize that I'm not alone in having this fear. Another step is in realizing that conflict is simply a part of living in relationship with others, no matter how close. Francis writes "Simply acknowledging that conflict is inevitable can help ease our fear of it. It also helps to remember that no matter how much we think we're drawn to people similar to us, to engage in relationships with others is to engage difference. Relating to difference is what it means to be in a relationship. It's not a side issue; it's at the heart."

Perhaps big bang reactions come out of holding back from voicing our differences to the point where anger has percolated to the edge of explosion. Scripture offers both good and bad examples and step by step instruction on resolving differences. If we can focus more on God's way rather than our own way there is hope that resolution can be both peaceful and life-giving. Meanwhile, the fear that tells us to avoid conflict is once again caught in a lie.
