I often speak to persons with varying ideas about the existence of God. While explanations vary from being "spiritual but not religious" to a lack of belief that there is a God at all, there are common elements to our conversations.

First, there is a hallow sound to their justification for their lack of belief. Second, there is an undercurrent of questioning that life really has meaning beyond struggle until death. Worse, death for non-believers is so final.


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Asbury Worship Series Insight Believing is Seeing

much more. Divine sight is like Xray vision that can see through hurt and struggle. Divine sight sees healing while human sight sees only brokenness. A person can be physically blind but have insight. A person can have 20/20 vision and have no insight.

Our new worship series, *In-sight*, begins appropriately on the day we Christians call "Epiphany" Sunday (January 6). While most

10:38–42, John 11:1–44, and John 12:1– 11. Scholars suspect that Jesus frequently stayed with the two sisters and their brother Lazarus, but these are the three stories of Jesus visiting them that we find in scripture. One thing is clear in terms of their type-casting, Mary is not Martha and Martha is not Mary. They are two very different people who both want to know and serve Jesus Christ.

This study offers an invitation for every one of us who feels like we just aren't godly enough... or loving enough... or that we just aren't doing enough. Our lives today really are not all that different from that of Mary and Martha in the New Testament. Like Mary, don't you also long to sit at the Lord's feet... but the daily demands of a busy world just won't leave you alone? Like Martha, don't you love Jesus and really want to serve Him... yet don't you often struggle with weariness, resentment, and feelings of inadequacy?

Just like the story told by Luke, Jesus comes right into the midst of your busy Mary/Martha life and extends the same

So we set aside a separate day of recognition to celebrate, not so much their arrival, as their departure. It is a miracle that these individuals travelled to find the newborn King. But the miracle began with the insight that they received to know to make the trip. We call this an "epiphany" or divine insight.

Beyond the obvious, these astrologers were not Jewish. In biblical terms we know them as Gentiles. That's the biblical term used for those of us who are likewise not Jewish. We believe in the same God found in our Old Testament who was initially known as the God of what became to be the people of the Exodus and are known as the "Jews". But this God is also the God of Abraham who is claimed by the people of Islam

What sets us a part as Christians is the epiphany that these astrologers were given that led to their discovery. That this newborn "King of the Jews" was also God who chose to be born human, live as human, die by execution at the hands of the powerful, only to rise from the dead. Human power cannot reduce divine power. Human insight cannot see that which divine insight can see. An epiphany is only a glimpse, but an epiphany can be life changing and affect the world in substantial ways.

By some estimates there are 285 Million people in the world who are visually impaired. Persons who are visually impaired are unable to see better than 20/40 even with corrective lenses. Approximately 39 Million persons are considered blind. According to the CDC, 3%

of people living in the U.S. are visually impaired. The CDC doesn't offer estimates of the percentage of people who are spiritually blind, but I'm guessing that we are all visually impaired, spiritually. We all lack divine insight to various degrees.

The tag line for our worship series is *Believing is Seeing*. When

we receive the gift of faith, of belief, we are also given a dose of divine insight. We are able to "see" that God lived among people. That Jesus Christ is also God. This gift of sight, like the epiphany given to the astrologers from the East, is the beginning of our journey to the manger. Our trip to the heart of God. The Bible becomes our corrective lenses. We are still mostly blind spiritually, but we as we grow in our faith we gain more divine insight each day.

During our journey together that begins on Epiphany Sunday, we will consider how doubt and faith are friends, how doubting God is part of our journey. Without doubt there is no need for faith. And sometimes "just believe" is simply not enough. I'm thinking that we ought to spend a little bit of time on why I don't like "church" people. This will take some explanation so stand by. Which comes first, faith or doing? This "chicken and egg" question is a great one for understanding divine insight.

I hope that you will join us each Sunday to talk more about gaining insight. The trip to the manger is filled with amazement and awe. Come and see what God has done for yourself.

It does not take energy to put Jesus at the center of our lives. Such insight gives us back energy from the source of all energy. As Christians, we hold onto the belief that Jesus is our center.

Meanwhile, retailers had their best Christmas season sales year in the past several years. Consumers will spend over \$850 Billion according to early predictions. When you compare aver-



age consumer spending of over \$1,000 each with our offering collections at Asbury it is clear that Amazon is more at the center in the "real" world. For much of the world, Jesus is at best a marketing theme for some lines of Christmas decorations. I am far from being the Christmas Grinch when it comes to gift-giving. While I claim that Jesus is the center of my holiday focus, the local farm store and a couple of online retailers got more than their fair share of my attention. Our family Christmas tree was adorned with packages with the toys that we purchased for grandchildren taking up a lot of floor space. Gift giving is one of the many ways that we show love for each other. During one worship series earlier this year we learned that giving and receiving gifts is one of the five love languages.

Yet I also know this: Jesus is the only One worthy of our worship and praise. We may spend a little too much trying to impress each other with our generosity but Amazon and Walmart are not praise-worthy. Nor are any of us praiseworthy. Only God is worthy of our worship and praise. And this need to worship is not something that is optional. Rather, it comes natural for all of creation. And it comes natural for each of us. It takes energy to avoid it, while worship gives us more energy than we can expend.

We end our current worship series, Weird, with a message that is titled simply, Hungry. The craving that we feel for physical food is only a glimpse of a deeper hunger that we have for spiritual food. We hunger for the word of God like a young calf hungers for his mother's milk. We crave God in the depths of our being and our hunger cannot be satisfied until we truly worship.

Hungry I come to You for I know You satisfy...I am empty but I know Your love does not run dry.

Come, let us worship the Holy Lamb of God, Emmanuel, God with us. Let us end 2018 with the hope and resolve that Jesus will be the center of attention for us in the new year and beyond.
