Cracked

This is the Sunday in our liturgical calendar when we celebrate the baptism of Jesus. In this rite-of-passage is a holy mystery. And this mystery is made tangible through what looks to the world like a transformation of who we were, to the person we become. But I suspect that what really happens is a rebirth of the person God created us to be. We are a new creation in the sense that the person God created us to be emerges from within layers of insulation built by instincts of self-preservation. Let me explain.



In order to make it through life we needed to "layer up" as a defense against the attacks of the enemy levied through persons we encountered who were in positions of power. Many didn't realize that they possessed this power. Worse, much of the hurt comes through people who loved us.

As a result, we live in a virtual cocoon waiting to emerge into the light of Christ awakened by the beams that find their way through the cracks in our armored layers. "There is a crack in everything" sings the late poet and song writer, Leonard Cohen, "that's how the light gets in."

We are cracked but this is a good thing. God's light shines in through our cracks and eventually our light finds a pathway out from our core that the world can see that we are children of the light.

"I have seen it," said John,
"and I tell you that he is
the Son of God."

John 1:34 GNT

This metaphor offered by Cohen has inspired me through the years to celebrate and give thanks for the process of metamorphosis that began with my baptism. Perhaps the process of rebirth began late for me. I wasn't baptized as an infant but as a young child sometime after my family settled into a home in Memphis.

Good Intentions

Jesus is attending a festival in Jerusalem and while there He observes a man sitting on one of the five porches around a pool. Apparently Jesus realized that the man was lame and had been so for many years. Jesus asked the man a rather invasive question. "Do you want to get well?"

Why did Jesus single out this particular individual? Did Jesus know that the man had been lame for 38 years? What might the Holy Spirit have said or done to get the attention of Jesus? Perhaps the man thought that Jesus had

Jesus saw him lying there, and he knew that the man had been sick for such a long time; so he asked him, "Do you want to get well?" ... Jesus said to him. "Get up, pick up your mat and walk."

John 5:6, 8 GNT

mistakenly concluded that if he really wanted to get well the man would be in the pool, when he answered "Sir, I don't have anyone here to put me in the pool when the water is stirred up; while I am trying to get in, somebody else gets there first."

Jesus tells the man to pick up his mat and walk. That's it. No splitting in the dirt and rubbing

But living in an environment that included a church family in addition to my own family, allowed the process of rebirth to continue. The process that I am illustrating here using a cocoon as a metaphor, to allow the light of Christ to shine into my very core where the image of my Savior is found. An image found within the very DNA that describes my true identity. I am a child of Christ.

Baptism is a ritual that is repeated all over the world. Sometimes in private, due to persecution and danger. But always in a community of others who similarly are in the process of shedding their cocoon so that their light can shine from the source of their identity. Our collective lights provide a beacon to a world living in darkness where

mud on the man's legs. No laying on of hands accompanied by a wordy prayer. Jesus' words must have been received with authority behind them because the man obeyed. Perhaps he recognized Jesus as a Rabbi and thought it best to at least try and do what Jesus told him to do. Whatever the thought process the man did as he was told.

This story has a couple of twists as it unfolds. First, it was the Sabbath. When Jesus heals the man who had been lame for 38 years, Jesus was breaking the law. Second, carrying a mat was also breaking the law, which the man did at Jesus' instruction. We can argue that what Jesus did was well intended and I am certain that it was. We can argue that a man just healed after decades of suffering should be allowed to carry their mat with them as they leave the place where they had begged for help day after day, but it doesn't change the law nor the consequences that accompany Jesus and the man's decisions.

Later in this story when the man is stopped by the authorities for carrying his mat on the Sabbath he explains why he was carrying his mat, but Jesus was not around for the man to point him out, and the man did not know it was Jesus by name. Later that same day the

too many have allowed their metamorphosis to stall. Too many have let their rebirth wait upon a rekindling of their internal flame that is kept dark by a world dominated by fear, greed and scarcity. They think that they can do it outside of the church. This misconception is the result of a fallen world. Our brokenness requires a miracle healing that can only come from our Creator. Healing is a

gift offered to all of creation. Baptism is a celebration of its receipt. The church is the cocoon that feeds and nurtures this process. man sees Jesus in the temple and tells the authorities that it was Jesus who healed him and told him to carry his mat. Jesus, at this point in John's Gospel becomes a wanted man.

Such relatively minor violations could be overlooked but in the dialogues to follow, Jesus makes it clear who He says He is and what His relationship is with God. The helping

Then the man left and told the Jewish authorities that it was Jesus who had healed him. So they began to persecute Jesus, because he had done this healing on a Sabbath.

John 5:15-16 GNT

of a man who was suffering was not the case that would lead to Jesus' arrest and execution but this incident is an illustration of the consequences that sometime accompany good deeds.

Doing that which God calls us to do will often come with unpleasant consequences in the short term. If this has been your experience then it is quite understandable if you decline to help even in a situation where you feel like you should.

The more important question is whether it is God's intention or your own. Jesus is later arrested because He claimed a special relationship with God that the authorities could not reconcile and most of all Jesus was a threat. In the same way when we speak up in defense of the helpless, when we lend a well-intended hand we may find that there are other consequences that seem unwarranted.

Sometimes our good intentions come with negative consequences.

So we begin our new worship series, *Insight*, with the possibility that receiving divine insight may come with consequences that we would rather not face. Join us each Sunday as we travel along with Jesus in the Gospel of John to learn more about divine insight.

John the Baptist had a holy purpose that sprang out from within who he was created to be. He preached to the crowds with words that encouraged repentance and baptism in preparation for the One who was to come after him. John baptized with water. Likewise, the baptism we offer is with water. An important but impotent testimony that we believe that salvation has come. The power comes not from us or from the water but from the power of the Holy Spirit manifested and nurtured through our collective work as a church. "Jesus," testified John, "baptizes with the Holy Spirit of God." An undeniably powerful initiation of passage that begins the rebirth of the recipient.

A rebirth that can never be completely stopped. Only temporarily stalled. But the birth pangs are felt by the emerging believer so strongly that each day of delay is torture that cannot be relieved by anything the world offers.



10:38–42, John 11:1–44, and John 12:1–11. Scholars suspect that Jesus frequently stayed with the two sisters and their brother Lazarus, but these are the three stories of Jesus visiting them that we find in scripture. One thing is clear in terms of their type-casting, Mary is not Martha and Martha is not Mary. They are two very different people who both want to know and serve Jesus Christ.

This study offers an invitation for every one of us who feels like we just aren't godly enough... or loving enough... or that we just aren't doing enough. Our lives to-day really are not all that different from that of Mary and Martha in the New Testament. So we set aside a separate day of recognition to celebrate, not so much their arrival, as their departure. It is a miracle that these individuals travelled to find the newborn King. But the miracle began with the insight that they received to know to make the trip. We call this an "epiphany" or divine insight.

Beyond the obvious, these astrologers were not Jewish. In biblical terms we know them as Gentiles. That's the biblical term used for those of us who are likewise not Jewish. We believe in the same God found in our Old Testament who was initially known as the God of what became to be the people of the Exodus and are known as the "Jews". But this God is also the God of Abraham who is claimed by the people of Islam

to be Allah — the God they worship.

What sets us a part as Christians is the epiphany that these astrologers were given that led to their discovery. That this newborn "King of the Jews" was also God who chose to be born human, live as human, die by execution at the hands of the powerful, only to rise from the dead. Human power cannot reduce divine power. Human insight cannot see that which divine insight can see. An epiphany is only a glimpse, but an epiphany can be life changing and affect the world in substantial ways.

By some estimates there are 285 Million people in the world who are visually impaired. Persons who are visually impaired are unable to see better than 20/40 even with corrective lenses. Approximately 39 Million persons are considered blind. According to the CDC, 3%

of people living in the U.S. are visually impaired. The CDC doesn't offer estimates of the percentage of people who are spiritually blind, but I'm guessing that we are all visually impaired, spiritually. We all lack divine insight to various degrees.

The tag line for our worship series is *Believing is Seeing*. When


we receive the gift of faith, of belief, we are also given a dose of divine insight. We are able to "see" that God lived among people. That Jesus Christ is also God. This gift of sight, like the epiphany given to the astrologers from the East, is the beginning of our journey to the manger. Our trip to the heart of God. The Bible becomes our corrective lenses. We are still mostly blind spiritually, but we as we grow in our faith we gain more divine insight each day.

During our journey together that begins on Epiphany Sunday, we will consider how doubt and faith are friends, how doubting God is part of our journey. Without doubt there is no need for faith. And sometimes "just believe" is simply not enough. I'm thinking that we ought to spend a little bit of time on why I don't like "church" people. This will take some explanation so stand by. Which comes first, faith or doing? This "chicken and egg" question is a great one for understanding divine insight.

I hope that you will join us each Sunday to talk more about gaining insight. The trip to the manger is filled with amazement and awe. Come and see what God has done for yourself.

Try as we do to find relief through any means available whether drugs, power, and whatever feels like temporary relief, but the pang is so deeply seated within that the effect soon wears off and leaves us feeling unsatisfied. Only the completion of our rebirth can bring relief. But the enemy excels at hiding this gift within our own brokenness in clever ways that we cannot detect on our own power.

"There is the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!" shouts John the Baptist in front of the crowds as Jesus approaches. The "sin" of the world. A singular noun that encompasses centuries of brokenness dating back to the first humans in the garden. An accumulation of layers of denial and attacks on our identity levied by an enemy who knows our weakness more thoroughly than we can ever know. A burden of universal proportion that cannot be lifted by our own power. But the hand that Jesus offers us must be grasped. We are invited but we are not

Mandated. Holy love is so pure that it can only consumed by our own willingness to drink the balm that has been prepared for us since the beginning of time.

"Come Holy Spirit. Come" we whisper to ourselves. "Come Jesus. Come." the Holy Spirit intercedes on our behalf when we are unable to formulate the words on our own. God is with us even in the midst of our own failure. Come to the waters of baptism. Be refreshed.

If you have never been baptized I invite you to schedule your baptism with me. I would be honored to be a part of your rebirth. If you children have not been baptized we will plan a celebration of baptism for them. Their age doesn't matter. Baptism is something that God does. We simply do the ritual. If you have been baptized once will do it.

The results already took even if you haven't felt it and others haven't seen it. Your baptism simply needs to be awakened within the nurturing love of a church community.

We celebrate the baptism of our Lord Jesus Christ because in offering us this ritual which God Himself also participated in, we have a tangible expression of a life-saving event that otherwise would be even more mysterious. How do the water molecules have their effect? This is a mystery that we can only explain with metaphors like metamorphosis and cocoons, but it is a mystery that can be seen in our rebirth.

"How can a grown man be born again?" Nicodemus asked (John 3:4). Come and see. Come and experience. Don't let the enemy convince you that your faith has little or nothing to do with church. Jesus gave us church as a means for coming together to be birth attendants for one another. Come and see.
