### I have questions too (Are we there yet?)



The questions are familiar, and some variation may be one of the first sentences we learn to form when we grow up traveling somewhere often. "Are we there yet?" the child says from the backseat. "How much longer?" asks the bored teenager. "Shouldn't we be there by

now?" the adult passenger asks his spouse.

Parents learn games passed down through generations in an attempt to shift focus toward the scenery. "I spy with my own eye..." says the participant, as he waits for the impatient travelers to guess what he's referring to. "Is it the snow on the trees, the ice forming on the rock next to the road?" comes a response.

#### I have questions too (Are we there yet?)

I once traveled from Detroit to Montreal by overnight train. Unable to sleep, I tried to imagine the scenery outside the window as we zipped past cars waiting for us to pass. But mostly, all that was outside my restricted view was darkness. "Were those sheep?" I wondered. Where is that truck headed?" I arrived the following day exhausted from a night of questions with no answers.

Pastor Haley is speaking at Asbury this week. In her article introducing Sunday's message, she shares some of her experiences with questions that she expected to be answered when she attended seminary. Her's is a common expectation that I also recall for myself. Her article reminds me of my own experience.

Spoiler alert. I still have as many questions as I did on that first day of seminary. Many are different, mostly because I've given up on getting answers to earlier questions.

I'll never forget my first day in a class listed in the course schedule as "The Theology of God." Wouldn't you think that this is a great class for getting answers to a few of the more difficult questions? This is what I thought too.

The professor introduced our first assignment. It was the first of three papers that would determine our grade in the class, and it was due in a few weeks. So, of course, there was plenty of reading offering insight for us to draw on in our efforts to impress the professor with our knowledge. And I couldn't wait to get started until I heard the question forming the paper's premise. A threeword question, "Does God exist?"

"What? Did I hear you right? I thought this was why we were all here. Because God exists, we're here to learn all about what that means so we can teach others." The thoughts in my head buzzed around a shrinking chunk of knowledge that we believers label as faith.

There's a line in a song I haven't heard in a while, and I can't remember the title. The song is written from the pastor's perspective, who sings, "I've got questions too!" But am I supposed to keep my questions to myself? If you all find out that I also have questions, won't your new-found knowledge diminish my credibility?

God puts people right through their faith in Jesus Christ... everyone has sinned and is far away from God's saving presence.


Romans 3:22-23

Paul believed that God existed and dedicated his life to living by the rules found in the first five books of what we now call the Old Testament. He was a belief lawyer, familiar with the finer points of law and capable of interrogating others who fell short of expectations.

Everything changed for Paul after an encounter with the resurrected Jesus. Years later, Paul writes that every one of us falls short of expectations. Elsewhere, Paul makes a claim to being the worse of the worst.

But his life-changing epiphany didn't end in despair. Instead, Paul learned that not only does God realize we're far from perfect, but we're incapable of perfection.

So why didn't God just smite us to use an outdated biblical word? The explanation is spelled out as a recurring theme throughout scripture. God loves us despite our imperfections. We are God's creation, which matters to God more than perfection.



In my time as a journalist, I often found that the most uncomfortable questions were the ones I most needed to ask.

As a former newspaper reporter, I spent years of my life learning how to craft questions. In journalism school I slowly shrugged off my Midwestern aversion to confrontation. I learned how to be critical without coming across as overly suspicious or negative. I grew accustomed to asking dumb questions. I rebranded my nosiness into a form of curiosity.

In the church of my youth, however, nobody taught me to ask questions and, for a long time, I didn't feel the need to. Faith was an absolute, and I took comfort in dogma. Eventually, this approach to faith was no longer enough for me. My faith fractured precisely because I never interrogated it, and I spent much of my early adult years wrestling with questions I had never previously dared to ask.

When I started seminary, I naively assumed that I'd leave my program with lots of answers. I thought I'd finally be able to put my questioning to rest once and for all. What I found, however, was that the vast majority of my theological education was about asking questions. In fact, the more I learned, the more questions I had.

While at times I yearned for the more simple and straightforward faith of my youth, I found that I grew immensely through the questions. The work was not always easy or comfortable, but ultimately embracing questions instead of turning away from them led me to a deeper, more expansive understanding of faith. This process taught me to have better appreciation and understanding of the innumerable ways that God speaks into the world.

The life of faith for me has become a form of questioning. It is the willingness to kick the tires even though the bumper might fall off. It is the humility to admit when you're wrong or when you can't find a perfect answer. It is diving into the unfathomed deep end of the pool knowing that it's a heck of a lot better to get in than to have never left the diving board. Questions allow for creativity and innovation. Questions allow us to reimagine what church is and who it includes. Questions allow us to move through doubt into a deeper faith.

I take comfort in the fact that Scripture itself is brimming with questions. Abraham asks God, "Will not the Judge of all the earth do what is right?" Job asks, "When a man dies, will he live again?" In three of the Gospel accounts, Jesus asks Peter "who do you say that I am?" In the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus hangs on the cross and cries to God, "Why have you forsaken me?"

These questions aren't always hopeful and they often go unanswered. I've learned to embrace that dis-

comfort. I'm willing to ask. I'm willing to have questions without answers and trust that God is with me in all of it. In my faith life, I often find that the most uncomfortable questions are the ones I most need to ask.

Bio: Born and raised on a farm in rural South Dakota, Rev. Haley Hansen spent her formative years attending small town churches, memorizing pop country lyrics, and biking down gravel roads. Prior to enter-



ing seminary at Boston University, Haley worked at newspapers throughout the Midwest, covering everything from pig shows at the Wisconsin State Fair to Aretha Franklin's funeral procession. As a minister and former journalist, Haley is passionate about storytelling and the ways narratives shape and inform lives.







means. In doing so, he explains how embracing doubts and questions can help us to get to know God better. His aim is to help us trust God in our everyday lives, even when we don't understand everything we may want to know.

This book encourages us to ask God the hard questions that stand between us and let go of our doubts. Leaving us with the confidence to trust God, even when some questions remain. Initially published in 2015, his revised and updated edition includes biographical stories about Afshin Ziafat, C.S. Lewis, and John Piper.

Instead, it was a matter of shifting priorities. God became less important than my ambitions. I tried to keep this shift a secret while not realizing that it's obvious when this happens. And God knows long before we realize it ourselves.

Scripture is full of stories about this happening to people. The results are never good. However, God does not give up on anyone. Some of us are slow learners, and it takes a lifetime to figure it out. Sadly, too many never do and miss out on the joy that accompanies trusting God with everything.

Our new series is based on a book by Barnabas Piper titled *Help My Unbelief*. In his book, he shares his personal journey with doubt and unbelief. And you and I gain insight into what faith really means.

The book title comes from a story found in the Gospel of Mark. A man brings his son, hoping to find a cure for his son's convulsions. When Jesus confronts the man about whether he genuinely believed that his son could be healed, the man asks Jesus, "I do believe; help my unbelief!" (Mark 9:14-29).

It turns out that embracing doubts and questions can help us to get to know God better. So our hope for this series is that each of us will come to trust God in our everyday lives. Even when we don't understand everything we may want to know.

Fortunately, God never gives up on us. N. D. Wilson writes in his forward for the book that "When we cannot see, we are still seen." Jesus searches for the lost in the same way a Shepherd never gives up until a lost sheep is found.

We kick off 2023 with a dive into a struggle that is common to all believers, doubt. Few of us call our condition unbelief. But our unwillingness to be honest with ourselves does not change reality. Until and unless we fully trust God with every aspect of our lives, unbelief has a grip on us.

that sticks to the farmer's boot like manure in the barnyard. Clay is obstinate and challenging. And water doesn't easily pass through dense clay.

Yep, this description nails it, but doesn't sound much like "Jesus loves me!" does it?

Speaking through the Prophet Jeremiah, God offers pottery as a metaphor but doesn't offer much clarification. "Go to the potter's house," God instructs Jeremiah. And while observing the potter along with Jeremiah, we gain insight into God's way of seeing creation.

Like the potter, God shapes mud into art. Like mud, We are shaped through life circumstances, mainly due to choices made by persons we've never met and can't hold accountable.

Scripture is clear. It works this way on purpose. While we're each made from mud, we're all mixtures of different types and shades of mud. God throws a lump onto the wheel that begins the creative process. Some of us are porous, while others are less so. Some of us come from primary sources where stone was crushed into clay. Others are made from clay that traveled downstream, picking up impurities along the way.

Potters often mix clays with different characteristics, resulting in a more durable and beautiful piece of art. For example, adding clay with more plasticity improves a very dense clay that withstands high temperatures and finishes harder and stronger.

The Lord said go to the potter's house...whenever a piece of pottery turned out imperfect, he would take the clay and make it into something else.

Jeremiah 18:1-8

And, as a potter, God knows that we each tolerate different levels of hardening and heat. Likewise, some of us are easily molded and shaped, while others are stubborn and resist shaping. Nevertheless, we each become what the Potter chooses us to be, whether by intervention or through the consequences of choices made by persons closely connected and by many we'll never meet.

On the other hand, even though the story's point in Jeremiah is subtle, it's powerful. The miracle is found in the language describing how the potter reacts to a misshaped lump of clay. The potter makes something else, not rejecting or abandoning the clay, but working with the raw material to change what is misshaped into beautiful art.

This sounds more like Jesus loves me but recognizes what I'm trying to hide.

In the Book of Job, we read a story that invites us up on stage. Job's story is our story when things aren't going so well. Like Job, we want to know why calamity happened to us. What did we do that was so terrible? Why are we being punished? And God is often silent?

But what if God decided to answer us? God enters the final scene in Job's case, but the answer isn't what Job expected. So, God has answered already in scripture.


More importantly, God sometimes answers through our connection with others and often through a tiny opening in our souls. Sometimes, despite our rigidity and stubbornness, God makes way for life-giving and life -changing revelation.

Asbury Farms provides locally grown produce used to create fabulous and nutritious meals. Our seed-to-table approach is community-based. This not only helps families make it through emergencies and crises. We help move families towards sustainable abundance.

Our Sizzling Culture program provides jobs and new skills to our city's youth. This includes year-round employment. Our staff and most of our volunteers come from the neighborhoods we support. We call this sustainable abundance because families move from need-based on scarcity to enough based on community-generated abundance.

Our work is also about food and justice. Our vision is a revitalized community where every resident can use their talents and passions for the common good, where children grow into active citizens. And all residents can enjoy safety, good health, and a culture that fosters life-long learning and satisfying lives. This summer, help us address food insecurity and strengthen Flint's budding local food system by supporting the Feed Flint campaign.
