Those known as the descendants of the "people of the Exodus" learned patience, but it took a generation of God's intervention for it to sink in.

Freed at last from cruel oppression in Egypt, the ancestors of those living in first-century Palestine learned to trust God for everything from basic needs to meaning in life.

Perhaps their special status or uncommon practices drew negative attention toward them. Sadly, they should be admired rather than criticized. Or maybe it's simply that God chose to document their plight as lessons for all humanity. The friends, family, neighbors, and acquaintances of Jesus knew both the struggles of their people and the divine promise of a Messiah who would free them once and for all.

God didn't just speak through one prophet, and some signs signaled God's plan unfolding. Isaiah told of a voice crying out in the wilderness that all should repent of wrongdoing in preparation. Micah speaks about a Messiah leading the people to freedom. And Malachi promises God's intervention into human affairs and a day of reckoning.

It feels like Christmas is coming soon whenever I start talking about the person commonly called John the Baptist. He goes by a variety of titles. Some parts of Christianity know him as John the Forerunner, while others call him John the Immerser. In Islam, he is referred to as the Prophet *Yahya*. Regardless of which modifier we added after his name, John was different.

First, John was a Nazarite.

Not much is said about this practice, but according to the Book of Numbers, Nazarites vowed complete dedication to God and abstained from any kind of drink made from grapes or containing alcohol from fermentation. Second, Matthew tells us that John's clothes were made of camel's hair, he wore a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey.

John was more than a fashion statement or an entertaining sideshow. He was a charismatic preacher that drew large, diverse crowds from around the region. And John was candid about God's expectations for people, calling out leaders in particular. His titles, however, come from his practice of immersing persons in water as a sign that they chose to repent of wrongdoing and make changes in their life.

Most important, however, was John's message that he wasn't the One that the people were waiting on. Instead, John was just as a messenger. His purpose was revealed to his father, Zechariah, before John was born. And Jesus first met John while in His mother's womb when Mary visited John's mother, Elizabeth, when they were both pregnant. God also revealed to their mother's that something extraordinary was underway. Just watch!

We all know who John refers to since we know what happens next. But as often as I've read the stories. I still find surprises whenever I revisit them. So I've learned to be patient even though I think I know how the story ends.

I love how Angela Hunt tells the story using conversations between persons not featured in scripture. For example, one of the younger brothers of Jesus tells how their mother shared God's revelation about her relative's son. In her book, Jude hopes to find his brother in the crowd gathered to hear John speak.

"Are you the Christ we have been waiting for?" a man shouts from the crowd listening to John speak. "No" was the simple answer. In Angela's scripture quotation, John the Baptizer responds, "I immerse you in water for repentance. But the One coming after me is mightier than I am; I am not worthy to carry His sandals. He will immerse you in the *Ruach ha-Kodesh* and fire."

Ruach ha-Kodesh comes from Hebrew. It refers to the Spirit of God. And what it means to be immersed in the Spirit of God continued to unfold throughout history. And the mystery continues today.

One day, Jesus showed up in the crowd as John was speaking and baptizing. And He asked John to immerse him. John protested at first, sensing that Jesus may very well be the One he was talking about when he said someone else was coming after him.

Jesus answered, "Go back and tell John what you are hearing and seeing ..."

Matthew 11:4

Sometime later, John would send messengers from a prison cell asking Jesus straight up. Are you the One? The answer Jesus gave offers insight into the heart of God. Jesus told them, "Go back and tell John what you hear and see. The blind can see, the lame can walk, those who suffer from dreaded skin diseases are made clean, the deaf hear, the dead are brought back to life, and the Good News is preached to the poor."

What can we learn from this response? Later, Jesus will tell His followers that they are to continue His work. So our answer lies in how we believe God is calling each of us to participate in continuing His work.

Jesus ended His response to John's messengers with this promise, "How happy are those who have no doubts about me!"



The guest list was apparently quite long and included Jesus and other friends of the family, relatives, and friends of friends. Weddings lasted multiple days, and the groom was expected to provide ample food and wine for all guests to have their fill. And this wedding was no different. But a problem was brewing.

The Gospels are full of stories void of detail. Rather than a fictional novel where an author takes us through every twist and turn, building characters with dialogue and description, the bible leaves us hungry for more.

Who is the twin brother of Thomas, or is she his sister? Who else was in the room when Jesus washed the feet of His closest allies? Who prepared the meals? What did they eat?

Beginning the first Sunday after Easter, join us as we explore possible answers to questions left hanging from Nazareth to Jerusalem. We start with a story of Jesus as a young boy gone missing as His family returned home from celebrating Passover in Jerusalem.

We won't dive into every story, but all of the tales add to a greater familiarity and a deeper understanding of the Gospels.

We won't allow best-selling author and theologian Angela Hunt to fill in some of the details behind the stories. Each week, after reading the story as told by Angela's creative imagination and gift for storytelling, we will dig into what scripture actually tells us. And we will imagine and share our own versions, as we find ourselves immersed in the stories of Jesus.

In a book from her *Jerusalem Road* series, *Daughter of Cana*, Angela follows Jesus from Nazareth to Cana, Capernaum, and Jerusalem. Along the road to Jerusalem, we will meet other characters, some only mentioned by name or reference, nevertheless, witnesses of God living among us.

You are invited to join us on Wednesdays at Noon to dig deeper into each week's message. You can purchase Angela Hunt's book, look for it at the library, contact our office for a copy, or pick up a copy before or after worship on Sunday.

For example, before beginning this article, I googled the "psychology of logical reasoning." And I scanned a couple of the suggested articles to get an idea of whether this topic is helpful, given the content of the chapters from Angela Hunt's book that I'm using to inform this week's message. And I quickly concluded that presenting this topic's technical description is unnecessary. But how did I get to this conclusion? I used logical reasoning.

In Daughter of Cana, Tasmin, and Jude travel in search of their siblings. Tasmin is convinced that her twin brother, Thomas, is not thinking rationally. Jude has similar thoughts about his older brother, Yeshua. Their conclusion is based on observing the behavior of their brothers in light of what they believe to be true about how the world works. They used logical reasoning.

In their conclusion, Yeshua and Thomas are not thinking clearly, being irrational, and perhaps letting emotions interfere with sound decision-making. Thomas should be home in Cana helping with date farming, and Yeshua is a skilled carver with work waiting for him in Nazareth. Their siblings aim to convince them to return to their respective homes. And they planned to use logical reasoning.

The problem, however, centers around Jude's brother. Yeshua is derived from ancient Hebrew and is more commonly known as Jesus. Thomas is one of several persons traveling with Yeshua and hanging on to His every word. "Where is the logic?" our story's main characters wonder in their thoughts and conversations.

We know from Scripture that Jesus selected a team of twelve persons as His inner circle. What isn't clear is how Jesus determined His choices and why those He invited didn't ask more questions before joining Him. Where is the logic?

Jesus said to them,
"Come with me, and I will
teach you to catch

Matthew 4:19-20

Matthew tells us that Jesus met Peter and his brother Andrew while walking along the shore of Lake Galilee. The two brothers were using a net to fish in the lake when Jesus said, "Come with me, and I will teach you to catch people."

While Jesus' offer to teach them something new was perhaps intriguing, Matthew offers no other context for how they both conclude to leave their nets and go with Jesus. We only know that they did. But did they use logic to make their decision to change vocations?

And Jesus was not quite finished recruiting.

Walking further, Jesus comes upon two other brothers, James and John. They were in their boat with their father Zebedee, getting their nets ready for fishing when Jesus called them. Like Peter and Andrew, the two left the boat and their father and went with Jesus. Where is the logic?

Nevertheless, the decisions of these individuals, whether based on logical reasoning, gut feeling, intuition, or rumors they believed to be true about Jesus, were lifechanging. More importantly, their decisions impacted persons they would never have met with a different conclusion.



Our work is also about food and justice. Our vision is a revitalized community where every resident can use their talents and passions for the common good, where children grow into active citizens. And all residents can enjoy safety, good health, and a culture that fosters life-long learning and satisfying lives. This is not to say that had one or more of them chosen differently, the world would be different. For example, we don't know if Peter, Andrew, James, and John were Jesus' first choice or if He was turned down by the first dozen or so individuals He asked. We're not told, leaving us to conclude this information isn't relevant. What matters most is these four said yes when given an opportunity to drop what they were doing and risk everything to follow Jesus.

I'm convinced that God finds a way even when we can't imagine a way exists. I'm also convinced that Jesus is always inviting new followers. And each invitation comes with a decision that may seem so illogical as to cause nausea. But, unfortunately, decisions that promise to turn our life upside-down are like that.

More important, I'm convinced a decision to follow Jesus isn't made through ordinary logic. Instead, to choose to follow Jesus while knowing that life will never be the same is to receive a divinely crafted gift. But this doesn't mean Jesus tells His would-be followers to abandon all logic.

On the contrary, Jesus offered illustrations to a crowd to help them realize that there is a cost to following Him. For example,

Luke tells us that Jesus explained that a rational person wouldn't start a major building project without first estimating the cost. Otherwise, Jesus explained, you could run out of money before completion. In this same way, while our decision follow is a gift and not based on our capacity for complex logic, we need not abandon logic altogether.

How about you? Have you made a decision to follow Jesus? If so, what is the logic?
