In the final chapters of our companion book for Letters, Lisa and Oliver reach their dream of owning their own store while living in their choice of places they call home. Thomas expands on his dream of expanding his business. And moves to Evergreen to pursue his romantic interest in Michelle. The town of Evergreen recovers from the loss of traditions that set them a part as a perfect place to raise a family.

It's a Hallmark movie, after all, where short-term setbacks evaporate by the end, and dreams come true.

Dreams are a common media for illuminating a better tomorrow. In dreams that inspire us, we' re unencumbered by what could otherwise be impassable obstacles.

Luke tells us that the Holy family took Jesus to the temple for dedication shortly after His birth. While at the temple, two prophets affirm Jesus is the long-awaited Messiah. From Jerusalem, the family made their way back to the home in Nazareth. But Matthew focused on a different part of their story. In Matthew's telling, a group of visitors travel in search of the newborn King. Stopping first by the royal palace, they raised the curiosity and jealousy of Herod, the reigning king of the region. After the visitors departed, by another route, Joseph is warned in a dream to flee.

The Holy family immigrates to Egypt to escape the wrath of Herod, where they stay until his reign ends. We don't know a lot about their time in Africa. But Egypt was a center of learning for that part of the world, and Jesus likely had access to this center of knowledge.

Joseph's dreams continue to guide his family, and they eventually return to Nazareth. These events unfolded in accordance with ancient prophecy.




And the vast majority of us are feeling the loss.

A meal goes a long way for a senior living alone, a family struggling to make ends meet, or a child fearful of empty shelves at home. But for the residents of Flint who carry the effects of lead-tainted water, nutrition is critical. Feed Flint provides locally grown, chemical-free, fresh produce to residents living in and around Flint. And we're hoping that you can help us provide 10,000 meals this summer.

Feed Flint includes takeout meals, produce boxes with recipes, and home deliveries as part of our work to guide and support families in moving to sustainable abundance. The reality is that Michigan's food insecurity levels got worse during the COVID-19 pandemic, and this summer's recovery is leaving behind those at the most risk of having to miss meals.

Flint families continue to struggle with the ongoing effects of the water crisis.

We're bringing together the resources of the Asbury Community Development Corporation. This includes Asbury Farms, the South Flint Soup Kitchen, the Asbury Community Help Center, multiple food pantries, and our Sizzling Culture Mobile Food Trailer. Our plan is to care for our neighbors when they need it most. We accept all people as they are, and our doors are always open to anyone.

Asbury Farms provides locally grown produce used to create fabulous and nutritious meals. Our seed-to-table approach is community-based. This not only helps families make it through emergencies and crises. We help move families towards sustainable abundance.

Our Sizzling Culture program provides jobs and new skills to our city's youth. This includes year-round employment. Our staff and most of our volunteers come from the neighborhoods we support. We call this sustainable abundance because families move from need-based on scarcity to enough based on community-generated abundance.

Our work is also about food and justice. Our vision is a revitalized community where every resident can use their talents and passions for the common good, where children grow into active citizens. And all residents can enjoy safety, good health, and a culture that fosters life-long learning and satisfying lives. This summer, help us address food insecurity and strengthen Flint's budding local food system by supporting the Feed Flint campaign. To make sense of the rise and subsequent fall of the American dream, Leonhardt tells the story of the modern American economy as an ongoing battle between two competing forms of capitalism: one that envisions prosperity for most, and one that serves the individual and favors the wealthy. In vivid prose, *Ours Was the Shining Future* traces how democratic capitalism flourished to make the American dream possible, until the latter decades of the twentieth century when, bit by bit, the dream was corrupted to serve only the privileged few.

Ours Was the Shining Future is a sweeping narrative full of innovation and grit, human drama and hope. Featuring the trailblazing figures who helped shape the American dream—Frances Perkins, Paul Hoffman, Cesar Chavez, Robert Kennedy, A. Philip Randolph, Grace Hopper, and more—this engaging history reveals the power of grass-roots democratic movements from across the political spectrum. And though the American dream feels lost to us now, Leonhardt shows how Americans—if they commit themselves to transforming the economy, as they did in the past—have the power to revive the dream once more.

We have a limited number of copies of David Leonhardt's book. His book was recently published and is available in hardback and electronic formats. The book is 528 pages. And, while Leonhardt is a gifted writer, the subject matter presumes foundational knowledge regarding politics and economics. Fortunately, the writer is able to explain complex topics at a level using language most of us can understand.

God assured the exiled Israelites, through the Prophet Jeremiah, not to give up their dreams for a better life. God has a plan.

I along know the plans I have for you, plans to bring you prosperity and not disaster, plans to bring about the future you hope for.

Some say that country music reflects the soul and spirit of America. Perhaps, but what is the soul and spirit of America?

While I would not dare claim that I could articulate the soul and spirit of America, I will say that any explanation of this complicated question lies what is commonly known as the American Dream.

Welcome to our new series to kick-off 2024 — a presidential election year — that we call *Country*.

Our companion book for the six episodes of this series is written by a New York Times journalist, David Leonhardt. The title is *Ours was the Shining Future: The Story of the American Dream.* Leonhardt reflects on our country's progress over the past century towards everyday folks reaching their hopes.

Pulitzer Prize-winning historian, James Truslow Adams, is credited for making the expression "American Dream" a household phrase. The crux of his assertion, according to Leonhardt, was the ability of ordinary persons to rise above the circumstances of their birth. The Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s declared in his famous "I still have a dream," speech at the March on Washington, "It is a dream deeply rooted in the American dream." Fundamentally, the America dream implies forward progress in terms of better, richer, and happier. Notably, political candidates since the beginning of the 21st century talk about restoring, rather than preserving, this dream. This is because for almost 50 years, incomes and wealth have grown little if any for most Americans, while they have surged for the wealthy.

In his introduction, Leonhardt asserts that while capitalism is the only proven economic system capable of making such a dream possible, that the version of capitalism in play today favors the powerful and enriches the wealthy at the expense of the rest.

Arguably, democracy itself is front and center in this year's presidential election. After witnessing the first ever contested transfer of presidential power, after the last election, punctuated by an insurrection, most of us dread the rhetoric and over-the-top emotional reactions that will surely come.

Leonhardt carefully lays out evidence that democratic capitalism led to the successful realization of the American dream by most Americans. But this model of economics depends on an effective democracy that gives voice to the majority and prevents the concentration of power. Democratic capitalism is impractical in other forms of government, such as dictatorships or monarchies, where power lies at the top,, and where only wealth and power have influence.

The Prophet Samuel oversaw the Israelites' decision to change their form of government to a single source of power. The leaders, who claimed to represent the people, insisted on appointing a king to rule over them. God warned the people of the pitfalls of power concentrated in one person or office, but they insisted. There is a lot at stake in this year's election. I urge us to weigh the claims carefully and to use both our hearts and heads in discerning who receives your vote.
